Pikes Peak Group Program – January 23

Roger Kilcoyne presents: Climbing Mexico's Volcanoes



It surprises most people who haven't traveled outside of Cabo and Cancun that Mexico hosts three of the top ten highest peaks in North America. These peaks aren't technical, but still present a challenge in a beautiful setting. The CMC has done multiple adventure travel trips down to these mountains that piqued my interest. The trips took a casual 10-14 days to climb these peaks, with generally larger groups than I prefer to climb mountains. Thus, the CMC timeline and approach just didn't work for me.

I called down to the same guide, David Gomez, at Nomada Climbing that the CMC has used for years, and we discussed what we wanted. First, we wanted to fly in on a Thursday night and leave Sunday morning. Second, there would be

only two of us and we wanted to travel fast and light. As the date approached, the weather on Orizaba deteriorated to the point that we decided to make other plans. It has never appealed to me to purposely climb under poor weather conditions when you have a choice and limited time. Thus, we climbed Iztacchihuati (or Itzta, 17,159 ft), and Nevada de Toluca (15,387 ft), and would be back another day for Orizaba.

We returned to Mexico about seven months later to climb our original goal of Orizaba. We discussed with the guides our itinerary, which seemed reasonable, but I wanted to push the envelope a bit. We sent him a revised template which outlined what we wanted:

· 3:00pm	Fly out of Denver
· 11:00pm	Land in Mexico City
· 11:00pm-3:00am	Drive to Climbers Hostel, sort gear,
	and eat breakfast
· 3:00–4:30am	4X4 road to Hut
· 4:30am	Start hiking from the Hut (~14k ft)
· 8:30am	Summit (18,491 ft)

So, 17.5 hours after leaving Denver, the plan was to be standing on the 3^{rd} highest peak in North America.

Come join Roger Kilcoyne at the Ivywild School Center, 1604 S Cascade Ave, as he talks about the preparations, climb, and adventures along the way. Happy hour at 6:00, program starts at 6:30 in the Barrel Room. Hope to see you there!

Upcoming PPG Classes

Pikes Peak Snowshoe Basics

Learn the gear, maintenance, safety and entry level techniques for this entry into the winter wonderland for many people and a common activity in the winter schedule. This is also a wonderful way of beating the ever rising resort lift ticket fees and crowds. There will be two classroom sessions in Colorado Springs on 07 and 08 Jan from 6:00p to 9:30p and one field session on 11 Jan all day. A general fitness level to go on a full day snowshoe trip is required for the field session. The first classroom is the combined with the BC Ski class. The target audience is someone new to snowshoeing. Cost: \$25 for PPG members and leaders, \$35 for all others. There are also rental costs from local gear shops if you don't own the gear.

Pikes Peak Intro to Backcountry Skiing

Learn the gear, maintenance, safety, and entry level techniques for backcountry skiing. BC Skiing is a great way to enjoy the wilderness with a little more skill and finesse, yet it is still a wonderful way of beating the ever rising resort lift ticket fees and crowds. There will be two classroom and three field sessions for the BC Ski class. BC Ski classroom dates are 07 and 09 Jan from 6:00p to 9:30p in Colorado Springs, and the field dates are 12, 19, and 26 Jan all day. A general fitness level to go on a full day ski trip with a lot of practice time is required for the field sessions. The first classroom is the same as the snowshoe class. The focus of this course is on learning efficient balance and weight transfer to manage an efficient kick and glide, so the target audience is beginner backcountry skiers. Cost: \$75 for PPG members and leaders, \$90 for all others. There are also rental costs from local gear shops if you don't own the gear and a trail pass for one day at a Nordic Center.

Pikes Peak Avalanche Level 1

This is the Decision Making in Avalanche Terrain course required for both HAMS and BMS students, and is highly recommended for anyone going into the winter wilderness. The classroom sessions will be held in Colorado Springs, and will teach how to develop a plan for travel on avalanche terrain, how to identify terrain that is avalanche safe, how to make safe terrain choices before and during a trip, and how to make an efficient companion rescue through hands on experience. This is the course to make all the other winter activities safer through your decison making. Classroom dates are scheduled for 28 and 30 Jan from 6:00p to 9:30p. The field session is scheduled for both 01 and 02 Feb all day. All field sessions are scheduled seperately as CMC trips. Attendance at both classroom sessions and both field sessions is required to successfully complete the course. A general fitness level is required to spend the day snowshoeing around and digging in the snow. This course will be on snowshoes only. The target audience is anyone new to avalanche skills and anyone wanting to refresh their expired skills. Each student will be required to bring their own 10 Essentials, appropriate clothing for winter travel, and snowshoes. The course will provide beacons, probes, and shovels for use in the field sessions, however please bring your own to learn from if you have it. Cost: \$175 for PPG members and leaders, \$200 for all others.

PPG Basic Mountain School - Ice Climbing

Time to swing some ice! This is the final module in the 2019-2020 BMS series. Completion of this course allows certification in the BMS Alpine Mountaineering track. Congratulations! We will spend the day learning how to swing ice tools and crampons, with multiple opportunities for you to ice climb. We will also learn about alpine ice travel including travelling on fixed lines on ice. It is required that you've completed our BMS Wilderness Fundamentals class prior to taking this class. BMS Rock Climbing class or equivelant belay, knot tying, and rappel skills are also required. If you have not taken BMS Rock Climbing you must meet with the instructor before class to pass a belay/knot/rappel test, then you can register. The belay test cannot be taken within two weeks of the class; it is your responsibility to reach out to the instructor and schedule it. Classroom session is 3 Feb field session is 9 Feb. Cost: \$70.

PPG - Technical Ice Climbing School

Starts February 10 Have you mastered the art of climbing rock, and now that the weather is turning you don't know what you will do with your time? Consider advancing all those skills you learned in BMS rock and ice by taking TICS. The goal of the class will depend on the group's aspirations and existing skill level, but will be to teach basic leading on WI3 ice and advanced skills needed for climbing WI4 and WI5 ice. If time permits, there will also be the opportunity to add some basic mixed climbing instruction as well. The evening class will be the week of Feb 10th, with the remainder of the class being held in Ouray, CO on the 13th and 14th We will be carpooling down on Feb 12th, climbing all day Thursday and Friday.Requirements: Completion of BMS Rock and Ice, and a lead climbing class preferred. Exceptions can be made for individuals who can show the ability to lead 5.8 or harder safely, and who have ice experience. Cost: \$185. You will be responsible for securing your hotel and meals while on the trip. Hotel rate should be around \$75 - \$90 each total for the weekend (2 climbers per room).

coffee, hot chocolate, snacks, and Barr Camp merch for sale. Note the elevation gain of 3700 feet - it gets the blood pumping, especially the first three miles. The trail is often snow-packed and icy in its shaded spots, so bring spikes/tracks and poles. We'll break for lunch at Barr Camp and then return through the historic remains of the experimental forest facilities. Depending on pace (moderate) and shuttle timing, we should be back at the cars around 4:30 p.m. We'll meet at the free shuttle stop in Manitou at 10 Old Man Trail no later than 7:45 a.m. We'll catch the 8:00 bus and hit the trail by 8:30. Old Man Trail is a right hand turn just past the Chase Bank on the right. This trip is primarily for Pikes Peak and Pueblo Group members. All others will be waitlisted.

Location: The Breckenridge Nordic Center in Breckenridge. Details: Learn the basics of this wonderful Nordic Center sport seen in the Winter Olympics. It is incredibly aerobic and can take years to master. However, one session can show you the basics. It is recommended that you have prior experience roller/ice skating, downhill skiing, or Nordic skiing. You must use specialized skate ski equipment that you can rent at the Nordic Center. Plan to meet in the Nordic Center at 9:00. The instruction will take place in the morning, then you will have the afternoon to practice what you learned. No tickets left.*

Trail Mileage 4, Elevation Gain 200, Driving Distance 15. Details: This is the Colorado Springs Annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count. We will be birding in an area just south of Pulpit Rock, encompassing the UCCS campus and surrounding area. Some of the area requires walking and some can be driven. You will need binoculars, birding book, and a general knowledge of identifying different bird species.

Seven Bridges to Bear Creek to Loud's Cabin

the Hub Parking Lot above Helen Hunt Falls in Colorado Springs. We will hike up Seven Bridges to the new connector trail to Jones Park. We will follow that trail through the historic site up to the area of Loud's Cabin and Chipmunk Lodge. We will explore the ruins in the area and return via the same route. If the weather requires it, we will change this to a snowshoe trip. This trip is primarily for Pikes Peak and Pueblo Group members. All others will be wait listed. Nat Geo Map 137. Register with leader.

Capitol Peak-14,130' in calendar winter

Trail Mileage 16.5, Elevation Gain 6000, Driving Distance 500. Location: Capitol Peak in the Elk Mountains. Note: 14ers.com does not show the winter route. Details: Sunday, Dec. 22nd: We will meet at Britt's house at 43 Misty Creek Dr. Monument, CO 80132 at 7:30am and drive to the Snowmass Creek TH from there. I-25 north, I-70 west to Glenwood Springs, Hwy 82 east. Then see directions from 14ers.com. We should get to the TH around 1:00pm. We will then snowshoe up Snowmass Creek 1.5 miles. Here drop down, cross the creek, and head up West Snowmass Creek. We will hike up 3.5 miles up to 11,400' and camp for the night. This is .5 mile shy of Moon Lake and makes for a 5 mile approach with 3,000 vertical gain. Monday, Dec. 23rd: Leave camp at 5:00am. Hike past Moon Lake and get to K-2, 13,664', which is 2 miles and 2,300'. vertical gain. From K-2, Capitol is only a half mile and 500 vertical feet away; however, this is where the technical climbing begins. Getting from K-2 to the summit of Capitol will likely take 3-5 hours depending on how much we feel we need to protect the route. We will backtrack our ascent path back to camp. It will likely be 6:00pm before we get there. Some and possibly all of us will tear down camp and hike out as some need to get back home for work. Notes: This is a difficult and serious climb. Required gear will be full winter overnight gear, snowshoes or AT skis. Helmet, crampons, ice axe. Rope, harness, ATC, anchor material such as webbing, slings, etc. This climb will have to be re-evaluated up to the last minute and even during the climb. We won't be able to get an accurate weather forecast until 3 days prior and we'll have to get an assessment of the avalanche danger right before leaving and then as we are heading up into potential avalanche terrain. You can look at this trip report which mentions some of the avy terrain. No tickets left.*
